



Typlex Polybutylene Pipes in WA Homes

Approximately 15,000 homes in Western Australia constructed or renovated between mid-2017 and mid-2022 are fitted with lplex Pro-fit Typlex 1050 Resin Polybutylene Pipes (Typlex pipes), which have been prone to leaks that have caused property damage and required replacement.

INDUSTRY RESPONSE

A number of builders are participating in an Industry Response package agreed to by Iplex, the State Government and builders.

The Industry Response provides property owners with rectification in stages proportionate to the number of leaks of the Typlex pipes: repairs and ceiling re-pipe for one leak, a zone re-pipe for two leaks, and a full re-pipe for three leaks.

Property owners can pursue a complaint with the Building Commissioner if their property was built by a builder that is not participating in the Industry Response.

LEAK DETECTION UNITS

Properties with Typlex pipes are eligible for a <u>leak detection device</u> to be installed free of charge, which will automatically cut off the water if a leak is detected.

WHAT THIS MEANS FOR YOU

- SELLERS will need to disclose whether
 their property contains Typlex pipes, has
 experienced previous leaks, or has had
 remedial action. Your real estate agent will
 ask questions about when the property was
 built or renovated, who built the property
 and whether the property contains Typlex
 pipes.
- BUYERS may consider asking whether the property contains Typlex pipes. Only Iplex Pro-fit Typlex 1050 Resin Polybutylene Pipes are subject to the Industry Response.
- LESSORS will need to disclose the presence of Typlex pipes to property managers and tenants.
- TENANTS are encouraged to ask if the property contains Typlex pipes or whether a leak detection unit has been installed at the property.
